
## A HUGE SUCCESS

The Highlands Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, assisted by SAR color guards in Revolutionary uniforms, from all over Florida, dedicated a 450 year old Live Oak as a memorial to the original Liberty Tree in Boston. That old elm tree, planted in 1646 on the road into Boston by Sam Adams' brewery, was a gathering place for the Sons of Liberty, and those who opposed English oppression. The Stamp Act protests in 1765 and the Boston Tea Party in 1773 started under that tree. In 1775, the British cut down the Boston Liberty Tree, but its' spirit lived on as a symbol of American independence. The Pearce-Lockett Liberty Tree was 100 years old when the original Liberty Tree was planted.


[On to the 20th Century and more modern history]

As cars and trucks replaced steamboats, a bridge was needed to replace the ferry or steamboat, run by the Pearce family for two generations. No government agency stepped up to build a bridge - enter, Sydney Pearce. He hired the Champion Bridge Company of Ohio, to build a steel swing bridge. It was long enough to span the floodplain, and a turntable swung open in the center, to allow boats or masses of water hyacinths



through. In 1935, Sid sold the bridge to the Highlands County, who moved it to Taylor Creek, and built a new bridge at the original location. The present bridge is named the William Sydney Pearce Bridge. After Sid's death, Edna took control of the ranch, from the days of the great cattle drives, to her herding or searching for lost cattle by helicopter. Edna Pearce, an extraordinary woman, was elected to the Florida legislature in 1949, and served until 1954 and was called the Lady of the House. In her campaign, she promised to get Route 98 paved to Sebring, and build a new bridge over the River. She accomplished both. politics in 1953, when she married English wool merchant James Lockett, whom she met on the Queen Mary.....When Edna died in 1991, her will specified that her home be set aside by the trustees as a historical site. She had put her home in a trust to protect it from developers. The Pearce Lockett Estate totaled 7,700 acres of land.....The Florida Water Management District took over and like most government agencies did not preserve the historical buildings and let the barn fall in.... ... When I moved my Jaguar parts business from Fort Lauderdale ten years ago, I discovered and fell in love with this magical time warp. Apparently at about the same time, so did Butch Thompson, a successful businessman from Venus, Florida. The difference was, I had to climb over the fence. He was able to buy and restore it, when a judge ordered it sold. Butch Thompson then began a massive ongoing restoration project, vowing to open and share this hidden treasure with historical groups and the general public. He built two open pavilions to replace the barn, replaced roofs and floors, and added sidewalks to make it handicap accessible. The house and schoolhouse are open to the public for special events. I truly feel Edna and her ancestors are looking with favor on Butch and his wife Donna, who has shared every adventure in his journey. When you visit, you will realize that Donna has quietly become the Lady of the House. ...... There is an aura to the Pearce Homestead that can only be felt by visiting and working there. The Heritage Association invites the public and opens the gates in April. I strongly advise you to [visit] Bring your children and grandchildren, and step back to the 19th century..... Butch Thompson has opened this legacy to you. I invite you to take this opportunity, attend and become a part of the legend. To feel or sense this aura, walk the grounds, tour the house, stand under the ancient oaks at the steamboat landing. .... Twentieth century local legends such as George Sebring, Melville Dewey, Oliver Crosby and Edna Pearce Lockett are recognized; but only the very aware realize that a 21st century legend is forming at the Pearce Homestead. ... Now is the rare opportunity to be part of a legend, as it is being written. Attend the Heritage Festivals in April, but also, become a Friend of the Pearce Homestead, add your skills and talents, it takes many volunteers to put on a Heritage Festival and carry on a legend. Many more are needed to share this legacy with the public. Like a quilting bee or a house or church raising a hundred years ago, many hands are needed, but the rewards will live on for your children or grandchildren, or histories not yet written. . If you visit, you will be back again. There is a magic under these ancient oaks...... Savor the moment in this heart of Florida. Take home the spirit of centuries past, until you return again.
